ARTS NC 2024 LEGISLATIVE REQUESTS

1) \$1,000,000 recurring increase for NC Arts Council General Grants

- "General Grants" funding has not been increased in over 15 years.
- Current allocation only covers 41% of the funding needed for these arts grants.

2) Provide all K-5 students with both Music and Visual Arts

- On average,1 of every 20 students does not have both Music & Visual Art instruction.
- Standard based arts instruction by licensed educators.

3) Make current funding recurring for A+ Schools of North Carolina

- Whole-school arts-integration- based reform model operated within the NC Arts Council.
- Increases overall school performance and student grade-level proficiency.

NONPROFIT ARTS IN NORTH CAROLINA

North Carolina's nonprofit arts and culture industry generated **\$2.23 billion in economic activity** in 2022. Investments by arts organizations and arts agencies were a key driver of the resurgence of local economies after several challenging years.

That \$2.23 billion in statewide economic activity includes:

- \$1.05 billion in spending by nonprofit arts and cultural organizations
- \$1.18 billion in event related spending by audiences
- \$439 million in local, state and federal government revenue
- 38,000 full-time jobs

ARTS ATTRACT VISITOR DOLLARS

NC Attendees on average spend \$39.10 per each Arts & Culture event in addition to the cost of admission.

Request Item 1 \$1,000,000 increase in recurring funding for NC Arts Council General Grants

Increase for General Grants of \$1 million would equal \$1 per capita for Arts Grants (currently \$9.8 million) Total per capita appropriation is \$1.13 for NC Arts Council, which is not competitive regionally to attract talent and businesses to grow North Carolina.

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NC ARTS COUNCIL GENERAL GRANTS

- **<u>NEW Sustaining Support Grants</u>** are open to ALL eligible NC arts organizations.
 - **Operating funding** is no longer restricted to invited organizations.
 - **Open to any arts organization in NC** with a budget over \$75k & at least one half-time employee.
- **<u>Project Support Grants</u>** for small arts organizations and other organizations that provide arts programming.
- <u>Military & Veteran Healing Arts Grants</u>
 - Back this year after a pause caused by pandemic.
 - Arts projects that serve North Carolina's military **service men and women, veterans, and their families.**
- <u>Education Grants</u>: Artists Residencies and Performances in public schools as well as programs that Traditional Arts Programs to keep our NC heritage alive.
- <u>Support Grants</u>: Technical Assistance, Accessibility Training, Artist Support, and Statewide Service Organizations.

 - Serves all 100 counties supporting diverse geographies and communities.
 - Provides industry leadership that is crucial for support of the arts sector statewide.

Request Item 2 Provide all K-5 students with both Music and Visual Arts.

1 of every 20 K-5 public school students is not enrolled in Music & Visual Art.

- Local Education Agencies (LEAs) would be directed to provide both Music and Visual Arts

 Instruction by a certified Music/Visual Art teacher,
 - For no less than 30 minutes every five instructional days, and
 - To no more than a **standard classroom size** for each grade level.
- Of the more than 630,000 K-5 public school students, **96% are enrolled in Music and 94% in Visual Art**.
- Music and Visual Art classes have been shown to **develop social emotional skills and improve behavior**.
- Creativity is considered the most important skill for employees by 72% of business leaders.
- NCGA passed <u>SL-2018-2</u> and already provides roughly \$250 million for Program Enhancement Teachers (Music, Visual Art, P.E., etc.) for K-5 students. (1 teacher for every 191 students)

- Founded in NC in 1995, the program has expanded nationally and internationally, serves as a resource for traditional schools, and needs sustained investment.

Low income students involved in the ARTS Throughout 4 years of high school are:

- 5 times less likely to drop out of high school
- 2 times more likely to obtain a college degree
